A new branch was grafted into the N.N.C. tree as Dr. John Eckel Riley was inaugurated seventh president of Northwest Nazarene College on November 5.

College church was the scene of the impressive ceremony as faculty members and official representatives marched in the regal academic procession. The Crusader Choir, under the direction of Mrs. Alline Swann, preceded the group, singing as they entered.

Presiding over the inauguration was Dr. S. T. Ludwig, General Secretary of the Department of Education. General Superintendent G. B. Williamson delivered the installation address presenting Dr. Riley with a charge: "And from you Mr. President, all I require is the faithful performance of your duties as God may enable you." Dr. Thelma Culver, Dean of the College, read the scripture and Rev. Eugene Stowe, Pastor of College Church, gave the invocation.

Dr. Riley in his inspiring address, "The Person and the Issues," accepted the challenge given to him by Dr. Williamson. In closing his address he said, "It is my firm conviction that only God can help us. It is my pledge that every element in the curriculum of N.N.C. shall be an avenue to Him Who is the Way, the Truth, and the Life; that we shall encourage intellectual thoroughness, scholastic industry, social and spiritual betterment; that we shall always keep the person in mind, and charge him with the issue."

Already as this annual goes to press, the branch is bearing fruit to the glory of God.

The Board is composed of ministers and laymen from the nine districts which make up our educational zone. These men are chosen by vote of their respective District Assemblies and the number from each district is determined according to the district's membership. The districts included in our educational zone are Minnesota, North Dakota, South Dakota,

Rocky Mountain, Nevada-Utah, Idaho-Oregon, Oregon-Pacific, Northwest and Washington-Pacific.

The members of the Board have shown a vital interest in the development of the spiritual, physical and educational progress of Northwest Nazarene College. This group of Christian men is responsible for electing our president, business manager, faculty members and all other officers; they draw up the plans for any remodeling and improvements made on the campus; they approve the plans dealing with expansion of the school's curriculum and in conjunction with the president they offer guidance in spiritual welfare.

This year they have sponsored the Mortgage Reduction plan in which laymen and ministers have contacted each church on the zone to present the needs of the school. The Board gave this plan a wonderful send-off by pledging \$4,000 in the meeting in which it was presented.
