# In Memoriam

The dark-haired youth is gone. His blithe step, his wholesome demeanor, his cheery smile and greeting are now but a rewarding memory. As he faced life expectant, clear-eyed and full of faith, so he faced death.

Dennis Butchart's testimony was one of enthusiasm blended with devotion. His complete commitment to Christ is evidenced in two excerpts from his personal diary, which read: "I have experienced the meaning of death to self and of complete dedication to God. For the first time in my life I have been led into the Holy of Holies, where God's presence is more real than anything in this world. It has lost all appeal—money means nothing to me now. Trivial conversations seem pointless and empty. At last I know what it means to pray without ceasing as every breath becomes a prayer." And again: "Isn't the way of holiness beautiful? It must be that many grow cold because they do not progress in the way of holiness."

Professors found him easy to counsel because he was sincere in his search of truth. Fellow students found him trustworthy because he lived up to the truth he found.

In a few brief months he endeared himself to us all. As we look into the sunset, we can say with him,

. . . Let us die working

Still tackling plans unfinished, work undone, Clean to the end, swift may my race be run. No laggard steps, no faltering, no shirking; Let me die working.
