# Administration



#### The President

#### A Word from the President

There are many reasons for the increasing proportion of population attending college—the popularity of cap and gown as status symbols; the tense international competition with communism in education, economics, arms, and space conquest; the more demanding qualifications of this technological age; the fear of future unemployment; the hope for greater security and for more and better things.

Above and beyond all of these lesser reasons are the basic drives toward collegiate cap and gown—the urge to self improvement and the desire to serve God and others more effectively.
