Italy

Italy has always been important in the European geographic landscape, because of its central location in the southern part of Europe. For nearly 800 years, the Roman Empire ruled much of the known world, but fell in the 5th century to the invasions of many of the neighbors it had once ruled. For centuries it was a puzzle of small independent kingdoms or city-states, but in 1861, it became a nation when its states were united. In World War I, Italy fought on the side of the Allied powers to restore order in Europe, but in World War II, it waged war against the Allied forces in the promotion of a fascist regime under the leadership of Benito Mussolini. Defeated, Italy began to emerge economically and socially, and politically became a democratic republic in 1946. Just two years later, the Church of the Nazarene entered Italy to officially begin its work there in 1948. A predominantly Roman Catholic country, the work of evangelical protestant denominations has been slow to develop. Yet, the Church of the Nazarene is not only present, but purposeful in its efforts to share the Good News of Jesus and spread the message of scriptural holiness. Presence is often only legitimized by buildings that represent our intention to stay, whatever the ups and downs of social history. In the story that follows, you will read of the importance of buildings in Italy, and the commitment of Italian Nazarenes of all ages to Alabaster giving.

Italy is active in promoting the Alabaster Offering two times a year (February and September). Italian Nazarenes are very grateful for the Alabaster funds that have helped the Italy District to obtain most of their church buildings.



The churches in Florence and in Catania have fine craftsman who built larger Alabaster boxes resembling a church. In these wooden boxes the churches collected their Alabaster offerings.



This year, in February, the District NMI suggested that the offering be collected in a very creative way using the motto: "Alabaster - One coffee cup a time!" NMI district president, Vania Fink tells us, "We gave each member of the churches a container where they could put, every day, the amount of money they saved in giving up a cup of coffee." From 1 - 26 February, the Italy District invited everyone to give up the luxury of a cup of coffee a day and set aside that amount of money for the Alabaster offering. The motto was "One coffee a day to build around" (in Italian it is a rhyme).



A couple of churches handed out little jute bags that look like bales of coffee, another church handed out paper envelopes with coffee beans glued on the outside. In the Italian culture, coffee is a very important thing. Italians drink a lot of coffee with colleagues, with the family after their main meal, or just to have a break at work or at home and, many of them like to drink good coffee at the Café which costs 1-1.20 Euro for a small cup of espresso.
