



Carol Anne Eby graduated from Trevecca in 1956 with a speech major and an English minor and then went across town to George Peabody College for Teachers (now a part of Vanderbilt University) to earn a master's degree in English. For one year she taught speech, drama, and English to grades 9 through 12 at her old high school, Boone County High in Florence, Kentucky. In that job she worked alongside her former principal and her former English teacher.

In 1958 she married Lee Eby, a Trevecca student whom she had asked for a date during a TWIRP week at Trevecca. They moved to Kansas City for him to attend Nazarene Theological Seminary, and she taught speech at Pitcher Junior High School in Independence, Missouri.

In 1963 the Ebys traveled to Papua New Guinea to serve as missionaries for the Church of the Nazarene. That year Mrs. Eby taught forty-eight first graders—quite an experience for someone who had never taught young children. For the next eighteen years she taught at the Bible college in Papua New Guinea, homeschooling her own four children all the time.

Mrs. Eby joined Trevecca's English faculty in 1982 and began making her presence felt on campus—with her warm smile, her kindness, and her delicious cinnamon rolls—until she retired at the end of the 1999-2000 school year.

Professor Eby, the 2000 *Darda* is dedicated to you in gratitude for your teaching and your Christian example.







Beginning a New Tradition





Building on Previous Success

Building on last season's success, the Trojan volleyball team earned a 22-17 record overall and finished with an 8-4 record in the TranSouth Conference.

The team's two-season record of 54-30 is the best for the program. The team finished third in the TranSouth Conference's regular season race, winning two games in the TranSouth Conference tournament but losing before reaching the finals.

Personal highs for this season include the following: Natalie Pifer was voted to the Region XI All-Region Squad and to the TranSouth 1st Team All-Conference Squad. Pifer also earned TranSouth All-Tournament Team honors. The sophomore from Frankfort, Indiana, finished fifth on the TranSouth's assists per game (9.08 apg) list. Martie Newman also earned post season honors and was selected to the TranSouth 2nd Team All-Conference Squad. This senior from Pinetop, Arizona, finished the season seventh on the TranSouth kills-per-game list with 3.30 kills per game. Natalie Cameron finished the season as the league's seventh best blocker. Natalie, a freshman from Antioch, Tennessee, averaged 1.03 blocks per game. Zorica Greeva was next on the blocks list in eighth place. A junior from Macedonia, Europe, Zorica averaged .97 blocks per game.



A Season to Remember

The fourth year of women's basketball at Trevecca since the program was restarted brought some rather impressive accomplishments. The season began with six consecutive wins that set a school record for consecutive wins and was the program's best start. The team also claimed its first victory over a top-twenty-five team during that stretch.

The Lady Trojans were on a roll. Soon they defeated Cumberland University, Lee University, Shorter College, Lipscomb University, and Lyon College. The team claimed its first top-ten victim. The Lady Trojans set a record for most conference wins in a season when they defeated ninth-ranked Freed-Hardeman. The Lady Trojans won a school-record twenty-three games and won eleven games in the TranSouth Conference.

The team also claimed the Eastern Division crown of the TranSouth Conference and made it all the way to the TranSouth Championship game. The team also threatened to broke every major team and individual record, including a seven-game win streak during the conference season.

Achieving a berth into the NAIA National Tournament was the capstone of the season. Not many believed that the Lady Trojans could go that far. Not many, except Coach van Beek—the coach who predicted the Lady Trojans would go to the national tournament four years ago, while the team was having a four and twenty-four season. This year's success was built from a vision, a vision that materialized to make history for Trevecca athletics and memories for the players and fans.

- 2 1908 Model "T" Ford introduced an affordable automobile for the mass market
- 3 1913 Federal income tax mandated with passage of the 16th Amendment to the Constitution
- 4 1917 U.S. entered World War I on side of Britain and France vs Germany and the Central Powers
- 5 1919 Prohibition on the manufacture and sale of intoxicating beverages legislated by the 18th Amendment to the Constitution (repealed in 1933 by 21st Amendment)
- 6 1920 Station KDKA in Pittsburgh broadcast the first commercial radio program

- 7 1953 Senator Joseph McCarthy (Wisconsin) began a series of congressional hearings to expose suspected Communists in American government

▲ Russian President Boris Yeltsin shocked the world by resigning on New Year's Eve. He handed the reigns of power to Prime Minister Vladimir Putin. In one of his first acts as President, Putin gave Yeltsin bodyguards, a pension, and immunity from prosecution.




▲ Alaska Airline Flight 261 crashed 11 miles off Point Mugu, California on January 31. All 88 people on board were killed.



▲ School violence continued to be a major concern. Since February of 1997, school shooting sprees left 36 dead and 77 wounded.



▲ Elian Gonzalez, a six-year-old refugee from Cuba was rescued after the boat carrying him and his mother went down in the Atlantic Ocean. Elian's mother drowned on their journey and a huge controversy erupted over whether the boy should be allowed to stay in the United States with relatives, or returned to his father in Cuba.



▲ Six firefighters were killed in a December 3, Worcester, Massachusetts blaze started by squatters in a warehouse. More than 15,000 firefighters from all over the world gathered for a memorial service.



▲ Russia came under international scrutiny for waging a civil war to try to hold on to the break-away republic of Chechnya. After months of fierce fighting neither side gained much ground, and a settlement seemed nowhere in sight.



▲ Raisa Gorbachev, former first lady of the Soviet Union, died after a battle with leukemia.





Arcelia Garcia gave birth to triplets in Arizona. Her husband and her husband's three children are the grandmothers.


A six-year-old boy in Michigan shot and killed a 12-year-old girl with a handgun he found in the house during his summer job.

Actress Madeline Kahn died of ovarian cancer at 57.


Desmond Llewelyn, Q in the *James Bond* movies, died in a car crash.




