Junior High School

For some time it has been thought advisable to organize a Junior High School. This has been done and Prof. Isgrigg has been elected as principal. The Junior High School will consist of grades seven, eight and the Freshman year of the ordinary four-year High School. There are several advantages to be derived from this organization. Heretofore the Academy Freshmen have been almost lost in the crowd so that it was impossible to give them the individual supervision which they need. The Junior High School will have special Chapel services and thus it will be possible to do more efficient work with the students along spiritual lines. The Junior High School will also have its own literary societies and athletics. The tuition fee has been set at \$25 a semester, which is \$20 less than the tuition fee charged for the High School student. Normal School

Northwest Nazarene College offers two-year and four-year normal courses. In addition to the theory and class work offered, the institution maintains a training school in connection with our Grammar Department whereby the Normal School students are able to gain actual experience in teaching. This is a great advantage and one that is not offered by many colleges. Although our organization for the coming year will be revamped somewhat, it will not in any way affect our Teachers' Training Department.

During the past few years Prof. Coral O. Young has been the head of our Training Department and we regret that she found it impossible to accept her nomination and election for the coming year.

Although we regret this necessity for a change in the Department of Education, yet we are delighted to announce that we have secured a person who is said to be, by both a General Superintendent and one of our College presidents, one of the outstanding teachers of the Church in the personage of Prof. May E. Bower. Prof. Bower is one of the most highly trained individuals in our de-nomination, having received her Master of Arts degree from the University of Southern California and since that time having pursued graduate study for several semesters. Prof. Bower has had wide experience as a teacher, having taught in the public schools for 18 years; in the Christian Workers' Training School, Huntington Park, 1910; at the Naza-rene University, 1913-22; and at Pasadena College, 1925-27. Prof. Bower also has traveled widely, having recently spent two years in educational work in India.
