Every student at N.N.C. will have a chance to get a free chest x-ray on October 17 and 18, thanks to the Idaho TB Association and christmas seals. The arrangements were made through Dean Hungerford — a former student of N.N.C. and the field representative of the Idaho Association.

The x-rays will be read for pulmonary TB, but also for evidences of heart conditions and other irregularities of the chest region. Each person taking advantage of the free x-ray will be notified of the results

A 28-game basketball schedule for the 1955-56 season was announced today by Coach Orrin Hills.

Sixteen of the games will be played in Nampa with 13 scheduled for Central gym and three booked for the NNC gym. One of the highlights of the schedule will come off early in the season when the Crusaders meet their traditional rivals, the College of Idaho Coyotes, in a two-game series Dec. 6 and 9.
