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Anaheim Assembly Sets Policy

This summer Anaheim, California was a bit more than the home of Disneyland...at least to Nazarenes. Between June 20-24 nearly 50,000 Nazarenes gathered for the 21st General Assembly. The four day convention was a time for policy formulation, the setting of future directions, and fellowship among an international group gathered in the name of Jesus Christ.

The General Assembly is the Nazarenes' legislative body. There were 800 voting delegates and of that number nearly 40% were from countries other than the U.S. and Canada. Nearly 80 nations the official version of the Church and the report of the God-Called Ministers Commission." The attempt to make the KJV the official Nazarene version was defeated but only by a narrow margin.

The report of the God-**Called Ministers Commission** was adopted as policy by the assembly. The report recommended the establishment of two new orders of ministry in the Church. The report added the order of ordained "Deacon" and "Lay Minister". Currently, there is only the ordained "Elder" who preaches and is called by God to lifetime ministry. The new "Deacon" order is the freshmen included, that means new friends, new learning, and the development of individual improvement. There is also the promise of continued and renewed revival. This summer I served as Northwest Nazarene College's delegate to the Nazarene Youth International Convention at General Assembly. A great opportunity, which left me with several different impressions of Nazarene Youth International.

First, I was thrilled to see delegates from many other countries. It was exciting to hear the delegates from other countries speak about God's work in their countries.

Second, the voting process for the General NYI staff--Secretary President,

represents

Regional Representatives, etc .-- was a great attempt at being a democratic process. For example, the presidential election proceeded as follows: 1) nominations were taken from the floor; 2) ten ballots narrowed the choices; 3) finally we elected our new General NYI President, Dr. Woody G. Stevens--a good man with several years of NYI experience. A great diplomatic addition to the General NYI staff are the Ethnic Representatives for the United States regions. Each region of each country also has a General Representative to internationalize ad-

ministration.

Third, the debates over the different proposed changes in the NYI organization, were both fun and at times frustrating. The debates were fun because I am interested in hearing the different opinions people had from all over our country and the rest of the world on the many issues. I found the debates frustrating when someone would push for an organizational policy which works for their area, but would hamper another area's opportunity for outreach. For example, in most areas of the United States limiting the NYI age

group to single youths under the age of 29 would not create a problem, however, many of the people of this age group in several countries are married at the age of 14 and would thus be left out of an organization through which they could strengthen leaderpotential and ship discipleship abilities. We debated 31/2 hours overtime approximately 90 on proposed changes.

Fourth, I was impressed with the different needs and ways through which Christ can be served not only around the world but in our country also. I was struck with the need to always be open to the guiding of the Holy Spirit in using different ways to reach others. We Christians in the United States cannot push our soul-winning methods onto other countries, and the delegates from other countries made clear that they do not want us to do so.

Finally, the highlight for me was that the main purpose of Nazarene Youth International (and the main topic of the convention) is to share Christ's saving power and love with the world. The NYI theme for the next four years is "Share His Spirit". At the convention, as Christians and

Robert Manley, Administrative Assistant for the Intermountain District, highlighted several of the other assembly decisions. He mentioned these actions: 1) The Church toughened its opposition to abortion stating that abortion was only permissable when the mother's life was threatened; 2) the Church also advocated "active opposition to pornography by every legitimate means;" 3) the assembly further adopted a statement to be included in the Church of the Nazarene Manual making speaking-in-tongues a doctrine rejected by Nazarenes; 4) the assembly established a to study committee "bioethics", that is, topics such as abortion, genetic engineering, fertility enhancement techniques, passive/active euthanasia, etc.; 5) elected John Knight

Church regarding theater, television, and other electronic media; and extended the committee to study the internationalization of the denomination.

Dr. Ralph Neil, chairman of NNC's Department of Philosophy and Religion, after attending the assembly agreed that the internationalization of the Church was the most vital issue. Neil elaborated, "One of the major issues facing the Church is its internationalization. The question is, do we make churches outside of Canada and the United States part of us or do we move toward unity. We must remember that many issues that Nazarenes in the U.S. are interested in are not international issues." Robert Manley added that, "The international church must make economic and cultural adaptations to adjust to the churches' diverse makeup."

This issue of internationalization of the Church presents both problems and inspirational challenge for

That episode of my life can only be described as an "experience." An experience that allowed me to focus on more than just the previously mentioned five words. I now see that any endeaver or action that has Christ as its sole example should and must be acted upon so "that they might know Him."
