Science building creates new opportunities

When asked what aspect of the new health and science building he is most excited about, Dr. Dan Nogales, Dean of the School of Health and Science, replies, "The thing I'm most excited about is probably the airconditioning." The existing building's air-conditioning system is literally non-existent. All joking aside, however, the new science building-in the architectural style of the Helstrom Business Center and the Brandt Center-is the talk of the science faculty.

While there was originally discussion of remodeling the existing structure, that idea was vetoed when the possibility of a new building

At the end of last semester, the SGA General Fund was projected to be roughly \$10,000. At the beginning of this semester, it held \$48. The General Fund exists for classes and clubs to request money for projects, events, etc. , that they did not anticipate during budgeting time in the spring. SGA (Student Government Association) receives a budget comprised of student fees; full-time undergraduate students pay \$85 per semester to SGA, part-time students and

Presidential campaigning has been going on since Bush began the first day of his second term. With over 14 mainstream candidates representing both Democrats and Republicans, only one is a woman. Senator Hilary Rodham Clinton, D-N.Y., is the first female to have a serious chance at the Democratic presidential nomination.

Clinton is no stranger to the White House calling it home for eight years as she served in the role of our 43rd First Lady. After leaving the White House in 2000, Clinton ran for the junior Senator slot in New York later that year and won.

Sen. Clinton announced her campaign for president in early January of this year. While she stands to the left on many major issues including gun control, gay rights, and a woman's right to choose, she has been considered a moderate in her party. Clinton recently released her much-anticipated health care plan that promises to "reign in insurance companies".

Here is an excerpt from her campaign website outlining the main points in her National Healthcare Plan:

- Affordable: "Unlike the current health system where insurance premiums send people into bankruptcy, the plan provides tax credits for working families to help them cover their costs. The tax credits will ensure that working families never have to pay more than a limited percentage of their income for health care."
- Reliable: "It's portable. If you change or lose your job, you keep your health care."

NEW YORK (AP) -

Iranian President Mahmoud Ahmadinejad questioned the official version of the Sept. 11 attacks and defended the right to cast doubt on the Holocaust in a tense appearance Monday at Columbia University, whose president accused the hardline leader of behaving like "a petty and cruel dictator."

Ahmadinejad smiled at first but appeared increasingly agitated, decrying the "insults" and "unfriendly treatment." Columbia President Lee Bollinger and audience members took him to task over Iran's human-rights record and foreign policy, as well as Ahmadinejad's statements denying the Holocaust and calling for the disappearance of Israel.

"Mr. President, you exhibit all the signs of a petty and cruel dictator," Bollinger said, to loud applause. He said Ahmadinejad's denial of the Holocaust might fool the illiterate and ignorant.

"When you come to a place like this it makes you simply ridiculous," Bollinger said. "The truth is that the Holocaust is the most documented event in human history."

There's something fishy going on with the SGA General Fund. The facts just don't add up. According to Business Manager Ryan Harter, the reason behind the money shortfall is enrollment. However, according to Carey Cook, Vice President of Student Development, enrollment is only part of the story; the other part may very well be incorrect budgeting procedures on the part of the SGA business manager and the Ways and means committee. Last spring at the end of the budgeting process, SGA expected around \$10,000 in the SGA General Fund. This fall, they had \$48. This is a significant difference, especially when you consider the traditional undergraduate pays \$85 a semester to that fund. This is evidence of a flawed system. When elected or selected to be an SGA officer, your training is supposed to come from the person you are succeeding. Of all the positions, the Business Manager typically receives the most training. The newly appointed Business Manager sits down with the previous Business Manager, Daphne Van Stone, the school controller of accounts, and Jan Gellerson, the head of payroll, and discuss how to do the job and manage accounts. However, when Business

Manager Harter was asked if he felt adequately trained he responded, no. Training needs to reflect the difficulty and gravity of the position. It is little wonder that issues arise with so much responsibility and so little preparation. In the next year, we challenge SGA to create a more functional and accurate training system. Next year's officers should come into their positions well equipped and able to handle any situation that arises. SGA Business Manager Harter has decided to remedy their error by absorbing the budgets of inactive clubs. From this, they have been able to glean \$4,800. What is confusing is the absorption of these budgets took place with no prior consultation nor approval of the Senate. The Senate allocated the funds in the first place, it seems logical that they would also hold the power to execute such an action. As students, we should be concerned with these issues because it is our money they are dealing with. This money is used for clubs, campus activities, charitable works and individual class needs as allocated by Senate. Without a healthy General Fund, clubs may be left with few options when it comes to dealing with unexpected expenditures.

Why does it matter that my family came to America in 1630 and someone else's came last year? My family did not have to follow stringent immigration laws, so why does anyone else's? The United States was founded on the backs and in the sweat and blood of immigrants. We are now dismissing this legacy as we are determined to keep so many people out. America's policies towards immigrants are far too harsh. The process for gaining legal entrance

to this country is long, expensive and difficult. In fact, the process is so difficult several websites offer kits to potential immigrants. If a Mexican national is desperate enough to cross the deserts of Arizona, do you really think they can afford \$69.95 for a kit to tell you how to legally enter the country? That does not include the costs of actually paying all visa, resident and green card

fees. In fact, the naturalization fees are as high as \$675. Biggest 'roids crackdown in U.S. history

PROVIDENCE, R.I. (AP)-

Federal authorities announced the largest crackdown on illegal steroids in the nation's history, arresting more than 120 people and raiding dozens of labs that manufactured growth hormone for sale on the black market.

Agents seized 56 labs, many of which were located in dirty basements, and recovered 11.4 million doses of steroids, according to the Drug Enforcement Administration.

U.S. investigators were helped by governments of nine other countries, including China, which is hosting the 2008 Olympics. Among those facing charges are a Chinese manufacturer accused of smuggling human growth hormone into the U.S. and others who allegedly got steroids from China and sold them to U.S. customers.

The probe, dubbed Operation Raw Deal, targeted manufacturers of raw materials needed to produce steroids, as well as underground steroid labs in the U.S., Canada and Mexico.
